Big Cambridge Survey 2015

The Big Cambridge Survey 2015 is now open, and last year's report is online: <http://bit.ly/BigCambridgeSurvey>

The point of the Big Cambridge Survey is to give students a chance to feedback on a variety of areas of student life, and give CUSU and campaign groups including CRs data with which to conduct campaigns more effectively. So far we've been able to provide data from the survey to help with several college rent negotiations, and campaigns to provide better welfare in colleges. The survey allows us to provide college specific data, and compare colleges on issues so you can demonstrate how your college fares against others in the university. We've also been taking data to the first ever University-wide working group on work-related stress, where it has helped us give a real picture of welfare issues in the University.

The survey has been tweaked this year to resolve some of the issues regarding its accessibility and to better respond to graduate as well as undergraduate life. For now it would be great if you could do the following, so we can carry on providing this data next year!
